












Home-Learning Challenge	English	Maths	Topic
 <p>Bee Challenge</p>	<p>Re-write your own version of a favourite story you have read.</p>  <p>Remember a story has a beginning, middle and an ending.</p>	<p>Take handfuls of objects (e.g dry beans, pebbles, or Lego pieces) and group them into equal groups. Write multiplication calculations to represent the grouping.</p> 	<p>Can you grow a plant from a seed? Try your hands at gardening. Make a journal of your seed's growth each week. A white kidney bean is a good option.</p> 
 <p>Brave-Bee Challenge</p>	<p>Write your own story that includes a heroic (good) and a villainous (bad) character.</p> 	<p>Write 4 story calculations about sweets. Use each of the 4 operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division). Use a pictorial or written method to show the answers.</p> 	<p>Make your own mixed media picture of a flower of your choice. Use a variety of materials and mediums to add colour (e.g. paint, crayons, pastels, or paper collage).</p> 
 <p>Super-Bee Challenge</p>	<p>Write 5 sentences using each tense: past, present and future. Use the same sentence to show how the verb tense changes each time.</p> <p>e.g. sat, sit, will sit</p> 	<p>Take a walk around your neighbourhood. Create a tally chart for the different colours of cars you see on your walk.</p> 	<p>Make a fact poster about The Great Fire of London.</p>
